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Council Member Tyler Dunegan Appointed to Serve on National League of Cities' Community and Economic Development Committee

WASHINGTON — **January 8** — Tyler Dunegan, Council Member, Osceola, Arkansas, has been appointed to the <u>National League of Cities</u> (NLC) 2018 <u>Community and Economic Development</u> (CED) federal advocacy committee. This committee has the lead responsibility for developing NLC's federal policy positions on issues involving housing, community and economic development, land use, recreation and parks, historic preservation and international competitiveness. The appointment was announced by NLC President Mark Stodola, mayor of Little Rock, Arkansas.
